

RSLC CONTRIBUTES \$200,000 TO CUCCINELLI FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL

ALEXANDRIA, VA – The Republican State Leadership Committee (RSLC), the nation's largest caucus of Republican state leaders, today contributed \$200,000 to Senator Ken Cuccinelli's campaign for Attorney General. This brings the total contributions for the RSLC in Virginia to over \$515,000 so far this election cycle.
